G12 Relative clauses

Defining relative clauses

1. Verwendung

- **Defining relative clauses** give necessary information. Without them the meaning of the main clause would be unclear.
- Who, that and whose are used for people.
- Which, that and whose are used for things.
- The relative pronoun can be left out if it is the object of the relative clause (= contact clause).
- There are **no commas**.

2. Beispiele

- → These days there aren't many Americans who don't own a car.
- → The number seven is the only bus that goes to Southfield Park.

Non-defining relative clauses

1. Verwendung

- **Non-defining relative clauses** add extra information. Without them the meaning of the main clause would still be understandable.
- Who and whose are used for people.
- Which and whose are used for things
- That is not used in non-defining relative clauses.
- Which can also be used to refer to the main clause as a whole, to express a comment on it.
- There are **commas**.

2. Beispiele

- → Life without a car would be a nightmare for most Americans, who are not used to relying on public transport.
- → Los Angeles, which is the largest city in California, is well known for its traffic problems.
