G13 Gerund constructions

Both gerund and participles can be used to connect the sentence

Alternative to subordinate clause

- 1. Verwendung
 - When a gerund is used after **on, before, after, for** and **in spite of**, the gerund construction corresponds to a subordinate clause.
- 2. Beispiele
 - \rightarrow On leaving the bus, the sky cleared up.
 - \rightarrow In spite of the traffic jam, we arrived on time.

No corresponding subordinate clause

- 1. Verwendung
 - A gerund can also occur after instead of, by, without, apart from, as well as, what about? It's worth and it's no use.
 - There is no corresponding subordinate clause here.
- 2. Beispiele
 - → Instead of running away, you should stay together.
 - \rightarrow Apart from the garage, everything was torn down.

-ing form with a subject of its own

- 1. Verwendung
 - Sometimes a noun (e.g. people) or a *pronoun* (e.g. *me*) comes before the *-ing* form, giving it a 'subject of its own'. In these constructions it is not clear whether the *-ing* is a gerund or a participle.
- 2. Beispiele
 - \rightarrow I can't stand people telling me what to do.
 - \rightarrow I have nothing against people doing their own thing.
 - \rightarrow My religion does not allow me eating certain foods.
